



## **What has been the impact?**

The impact regarding the PE Premium allocation is scrutinised and reported on once the related activities have been undertaken. Areas which are taken into account when measuring the impact are as follows:

- Increase in participation rates in a range of specific activities.
- Increase and success in competitive school sports.
- Growth in the range of provisional and alternative activities.
- Improvement in partnership work on physical education with other schools and local partners.
- Links with other subjects that contribute to pupil's overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills.
- Greater awareness among pupils of the dangers of obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupil's health.

## **Activity Impact Due to Spend:**

### 1.Outdoor Education Residential – Derwent Hill

10 KS2 students accessed a week long residential to Derwent Hill, which is an adventure/outdoor activity centre in Keswick.

Whilst there the students learned to become more independent as they had to make their own beds on arrival, maintain a clean room as there were inspections every morning, look after their own equipment and strip their own beds at the end of the week. Students also had to make sure that at each meal time their table was clean and a nominated person had to clear all of the table's dishes. This person changed each day.

Students also developed teamwork and communication skills whilst accessing activities such as gauge walking, which requires a great deal of communication and students helping each other.

Students developed new skills by accessing activities which they had not done before i.e. canoeing.

All students who accessed the residential thoroughly enjoyed their time there and said that they would like to go back. There is extensive photo and multimedia documentation from the trip to show what activities students were taking part in and how students coped with each challenge that was put in front of them.

### 2.Firtree Riding School

Currently 20 learners have accessed the riding school and another 10 are still awaiting their six week block course.

The impact has been very beneficial to the social, moral and cultural development of KS2 learners. They have learned how to care for the horses, how to be gentle and treat them well, been active in running alongside and riding the horses and have developed their communication skills as they have had to listen to the leaders instructions. They have also learned how to communicate with the horses by learning how to teach the horse to walk, stop and change direction.

### 3. External Hire of Football Venue

Football matches are currently being played which has improved confidence and self-esteem of KS2 learners. Due to the use of funding the KS2 team at Deneview competed in and won a tournament which was held at North Shields in March 2016.

### 4. Trampoline Qualification

80% of KS2 Deneview students were able to access trampolining during this period. Students that have taken part have thoroughly enjoyed the experience of learning new skills and it has also given some students an increase in self-confidence and a will to try new exercise based activities.
