PE Premium 2016-2017

The PE Premium is extra funding provided by the Government to fund improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils, in the 2016 to 2017 academic year so that they are encouraged to develop healthy, active lifestyles.

At Trinity School we currently have 40 primary aged pupils therefore the school is eligible to receive £8000 plus £5 per eligible pupil

What has been the impact?

The impact regarding the PE Premium allocation is scrutinised and reported on once the related activities have been undertaken. Areas which are taken into account when measuring the impact are as follows:

- C1 Increase in participation rates in a range of specific activities.
- C2 Increase and success in competitive school sports.
- C3 -Growth in the range of provisional and alternative activities.
- C4 -Improvement in partnership work on physical education with other schools and local partners.
- C5 -Links with other subjects that contribute to pupil's overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills.
- C6 -Greater awareness among pupils of the dangers of obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupil's health.

Activities where the impact of the premium is now being measured are as follows:

1.Cycling

£2000 of the funding was used to introduce a long term cycling programme to the KS2 learners on the Deneview site. 6 size appropriate cycles were purchased from KB cycles along with adequate health and safety equipment.

30 KS2 learners have been able to access the use of the cycles so far in 2017.

Dave Buchan from a cycle education company called Bikes4Health has delivered a comprehensive cycle programme for 30 KS2 learners of all abilities and delivered CPD for a long term programme so it can be run by staff at Deneview. The programme has included an assessment of the learners with a view to improving their cycling ability. 1 learner has developed from non cyclist to being able to ride and all 29 others on the course have improved there bike handling skills.

Criteria achieved: C1, C3, C4, C6.

2.Outdoor Education Centre

£3800 - After a successful residential visit in December 2015 where it was accessed by 10 key stage 2 learners, Derwent Hill Outdoor Education Centre was visited by 10 learners from Deneview who had a fantastic educational experience. This experience focussed on the learners taking personal responsibility for their individual areas and 5 intensive days of team building activities. Any remaining funds from this allocation will be used in the annual Beadnell outdoor education residential.

Impact criteria which was encountered by learners during residential: C1, C2, C3, C4, C5, C6.

3. Purchase of PE Equipment

The PE Premium has allowed a budget of £1400 to allow the purchase of equipment which will encourage the participation of KS2 learners into a range of different competitive and non competitive sporting activities which in turn will encourage healthy, active lifestyles.

It is planned that prior to conclusion of summer term 2017, all KS2 learners will have accessed the specialist equipment which has been purchased.

Criteria to be achieved by end of summer term 2017: C1, C2, C3, C5, C6.

4. Trampoline Park

The Newcastle trampoline park at West Gate, Newcastle is booked and is to be used by KS2 learners from Deneview in Summer term. It is envisaged that all key stage 2 learners will access the centre which will further encourage healthy active lifestyles.

Criteria which will be achieved: C1,C3, C5, C6.

5. CPD

£200 Archery course has been completed by Ben Clyde who is now able to use the purchased equipment to deliver archery to KS2 learners long term at Deneview.

It is planned that all KS2 learners will access the archery provision prior to end of summer 2017.

Criteria to be achieved: C1, C2, C3, C5, C6.
